Paint Love brings extraordinary arts programming that empowers youth and strengthens communities.

We envision a world where all young people have access to creative experiences that help them imagine a future not limited by adversity and develop the creative skills to enact change.

We partner with K-12 schools and nonprofit organizations to engage youth through projects that are artist-led and specially formulated to meet kids whereever they are.

ART IS ESSENTIAL. Art is critically important and wonderful all on its own, but Paint Love projects also go deeper. Art is our vehicle, but the soul of our work is showing youth that their voice matters, their ideas are important, and their actions can make a difference in shaping the future.

ne of our partner nonprofits, Kate's Club, serves kids who are coping with the death of a parent or sibling. They do not charge families and provide a safe place to express and manage grief. To go along with the recent theme "If my tears could talk," Paint Love volunteer artist, professional sculpture and master's in social work candidate, Nikita Raper, collaborated with Laura Shaw, Paint Love's executive director and Lane Pease, Kate's Club director of programming to construct a project helping kids identify their emotions and think about how their grief expresses itself: is it small and quiet like a mouse? Does it roar like a lion, get angry like a rhinoceros, or snap like a crocodile? Is it ever-present like a loyal dog? Kids punched, shaped, scored and slipped using air-dry clay to create elaborate animal "maws" or mask-like mouthpieces, mounted on a dowel, to give their grief a voice.

This is just one example of how we are investing in the creative and mental health of the children we serve.

Over the last seven years, we have brought this truly extraordinary programming to under-resourced schools and youth-serving nonprofits and become one of the most highly-sought after art and trauma programs in Atlanta and beyond.

Our model is really working and is scale-able. If we have the resources to scale, we could bring this high caliber of trauma-informed, intentional, creative impact to so many more youth facing poverty and trauma in our community.





PAINT LOVE PROGRAMS

Nonprofit partnership Program

Most nonprofit programs follow our "Art as Response" model, incorporating themes that directly respond to collective trauma such as experiencing racism, or shared experiences among the demographic served, such as:

- Metal-smith jewelry making pendants with affirmations of self-worth with girls who have experienced neglect within the foster care system
- Chalk "video games" with newcomer refugees, where teams plan, draw, and move through a 2-D obstacle course and experience moving their bodies to overcome challenges representative of their capacity to do so in real life.

School Partnership Program

School partnerships prioritze Title 1 schools and are largely oriented as "Art as Advocacy" like:

- Slam poetry showing seventh graders that their voice matters, and to speak up to address bullying and create a more supportive community.
- The Artist Mentor program serves high schoolers interested in creative-sector careers but facing attendance challenges. Our pilot year served eight students, mentored by professional artists in their field.

In-House Programs

Open community programming includes a five-week summer camp, serving 60 students (half on scholarship) and free monthly community projects for kids and families held at a public park, serving 100 individuals.

2021 events included puppetry, nature mobiles, family yoga, graffiti arts, paper making, and mask making. All events build community between family members and community members.



PROGRAM THEMES

Typically, our programming fits into one of the three categories below. This theme, coupled with a modality, is the basic structure for building programming for your site.

Art as response

If your community has experienced a difficult event or crisis, creative expression can be incredibly powerful in community building and processing.

Example: Through a partnership with the Decatur Education Foundation and Renfroe Middle School, students created poems, guided by professional Paint Love poets, around the grief of a classmate lost to suicide.

Art as prevention

Our programming is built to teach Social Emotional Learning (SEL) skills. These skills, like self-awareness, social responsibility, self-regulation and community connection, prepare kids for being better and kinder to themselves and others.

Example: Austell Youth Innovation Center invited Paint Love to create a mural at their new youth space. Community members painted the mural together and discussed the strengths of their community, along with ways to improve it.

Art as advocacy

Creativity and advocacy go hand-in-hand. Artists give us the vision to see a new future. These Offerings can be for specific awareness campaigns and months (Black history, AAPI, Latinx, Earth Day, etc) or how to use our art to empower your voice.

Example: For Black History Month, the City of Roswell invited Paint Love to host a series of projects for community members on black artists. Paint Love staff shared the stories of the artists while kids explored their mediums of choice.

Customized to each partnership

Our different approaches- called modalities- allow us to provide programming in the most impactful way for your community. Our staff is highly-trained and seasoned in providing services through each option.





Large Group Activity

Large group activities are often one-time events for a community, agency, or school to create together. These can range across a number of projects and themes. These projects impact the most students with the smallest time investment.



Mural or Large-Scale Collaborative Piece

Collaborative, community-building art projects for a class, grade, school, or neighborhood - featuring options for temporary or permanent installation or mural projects. These typically require longer periods of time to complete.



Movement + Art

Movement is incredibly valuable to a child's learning and processing.

Movement + Art combines yoga, dance, and play to create around a theme. This option is done best with a smaller group over a series of sessions.



Small Group Activity

Small group activities are focused on a single population or group. These activities may be more complex and provide for more intimate, focused conversation. Small group activities can occur once or over a set of sessions.




HOW WE CREATE VALUE

Paint Love creates value for our nonprofit and school partners by bringing extraordinary arts programming to youth who otherwise would not be exposed to these types of creative experiences.

Art is about humanity and expression and joy - and these are all important. But art also makes a big impact in relation to stress and trauma. Studies show that prolonged and unbuffered exposure to stress, including trauma and living in poverty, impacts kids' developing brains and can have a permanent effect on cognitive ability, physical and mental health, and academic achievement.

Art and creative education is shown to reduce stress and anxiety, build critical social-emotional skills, and close the academic achievement gap. Students from low income families and under resourced communities often have the most to gain from these positive outcomes art brings, and yet frequently have the least access to artistic experiences and creative instruction.

HOW WE ARE DIFFERENT

We are trauma-informed.

"Trauma-informed" in the context of Paint Love's model, means:

- maintaining an understanding of all the ways experiencing trauma can impact youth, their behavior, development, and even creativity.
- meeting kids where they are and inviting them into the creative process so they can have a positive, fun, and meaningful experience.

Understanding trauma and knowing the ways it can manifest (like behavioral issues), helps us strive to follow best practices for serving kids who have experienced a lot of tough things. But we know individuals are more than their trauma, and the kids we serve are still just kids. It's helpful to think about the ways trauma can impact developing brains, but it's even more important to remember that the youth we serve want the same things any other kid wants — to be loved, seen, and accepted for who they are, and to have fun.

We are experts.

Our diverse team of experts stretches across disciplines: we are artists and creators, social workers and clinicians, teachers, and traumainformed specialists. For each program, we craft each project specifically for that partner and the demographic of youth they serve.

While other programs offer a catalogue of set projects they can easily replicate across all audiences, Paint Love's team crafts each experience to best serve the youth at each and every partner site.

We are communityfocused.

We listen and work together with the partners and communities we serve. We don't approach partnerships offering prescribed solutions- we listen and learn and are constantly changing and growing to figure out the types of projects, materials, approaches, themes, and goals that will make the most impact for each group we serve. This means that success looks different for each partner and each project, but our aim is to learn what impact our partners actually need, and then use our expert team to figure out how to make it happen.



"What strikes me most is the way Paint Love brings the power of creativity and self-expression to touch the lives of children who have been hurt or are vulnerable to their circumstances. I can think of few activities as empowering and healing as inviting a person to bring themselves into the external world through their art. Paint Love has given our kids the opportunity to build resiliency, both in an interpersonal manner by being around other similarly affected children, and also by engaging in the physical, mental and spiritual process of creating something. I saw a child who decorated her project with the statement 'your scars make you beautiful.' This statement could be a testament to resilient cognitions. Using them in an art format can really help children internalize these kinds of messages since they are interacting with them in a physical way rather than just saying or writing them down."




Success looks different for each of our partners.


Impact looks like consistency at some sites, like Jesse's House and Wellspring Living, where we work with teen girls who haven't had a lot of stability in their lives, we are making sure artists commit to at least 3 consecutive sessions to ensure dependability and build trust.

Impact looks like growing community at many of our Title 1 school partners where building community and camaraderie between grades and working on large-scale collaborative projects like murals is nearly impossible for art teachers with few resources.

HOW TO SET THE KIDS UP FOR SUCCESS IN OUR PROJECTS:

- We've integrated new waves of thinking about trauma into our programming and look at each project under the lens of what steps their brains and bodies need to go through in order to feel safe and relaxed enough to create and fully engage.
- We are incorporating more and more knowledge and understanding and expertise into developing each project, but at the core of it all is creativity and the supportive space for young people to express themselves and know that they matter and their voice is important.





WHERE WE'RE HEADED

Meeting Demand

We want to be able to serve all the kids we can, but do it right. Since our inception, we've operated with a long waiting list of community organizations and schools looking for programming.

Extending Capacity

We want to reach further and expand to bring more art to more kids (this means more staff, more artists, more clay and glitter glue!)

Growing

Our model is easy to scale and replicate. We have seven years of experience perfecting our model and we're ready to expand and grow.

ARTIST MENTORSHIP PROGRAM

HOW THE PANDEMIC CHANGED EVERYTHING

THE PANDEMIC POSED A NEW BARRIER TO STUDENTS AS MENTAL HEALTH ISSUES IN TEENS ROSE AND THE DROP-OUT RATE DOUBLED AT SOUTH COBB HIGH SCHOOL, WHERE OUR PROGRAM DIRECTOR, MANDY NOA, IS A FULL-TIME SCHOOL SOCIAL WORKER. FAMILIES STRUGGLED THROUGH JOB LOSS AND HEALTH ISSUES CAUSING MANY TEENAGERS TO FOREGO SCHOOL TO WORK OR CARE FOR SIBLINGS. A MAJORITY OF STUDENTS WHO DROPPED OUT WERE CATEGORIZED AS "ECONOMICALLY-DISADVANTAGED" AND ENGLISH-LANGUAGE LEARNERS, MOST BEING BLACK AND HISPANIC MALES.

THE NEED IN THE COMMUNITY

Paint Love's mission is to provide art programming to all students but also support the artist community. By supporting the artist community in its youth, artists can enter the profession with wisdom, connections, and education. Paint Love's mentor program promotes creative sector professions and builds the artist community within Atlanta, while promoting the graduation rates of local districts.

In Georgia, students over 16 are required to attend school. If students do not attend, a court referral can be made for truancy issues.

Data shows that lack of engagement and chronic absenteeism may lead to poor overall health and financial stress in the future.

Often, teens facing barriers to attendance are BIPOC - and have a host of other barriers for their education. In Georgia the 2020 graduation rate is 83.8%. Metro Atlanta counties range from 76%-83%. 97.6% of white students graduate in Georgia with only 82% of hispanic students and 77.6% of black students graduating.

ELEVATING THE EXTRAORDINARY

Since our inception in 2014, Paint Love's mission has been to partner with local artists to share their medium and expertise to bring extraordinary creative experiences to young people who do not have access to high-quality arts education.

The Cohort program builds on our years of experience training artists to become trauma-informed to more fully empower artists in their journey as creatives, teachers, and leaders in our community. During their cohort year, artists will learn functional basics not often taught to artists without formal classroom teacher training such as classroom management and fundamentals of instruction in a hands-on, inclusive and accessible manner that meets each student where they are for a positive creative experience.

Cohort members will also focus on elevating the "extraordinary" elements of arts education - bringing the magic and wonder of a memorable and meaningful experience that will resonate with students beyond their time in the classroom.


